Telus Mosaic 2009 South Asian festival director Asma Arshad Mahmood said Mississauga sometimes is forced to settle for events that could be considered less than the best in terms of the arts. She was speaking last night at the festival preview, held at the Art Gallery of Mississauga. She hopes to change things with Mosaic, which is celebrating its fourth anniversary this year. There will also be performances the Kathak dance duo Vidha and Abhimanyu Lal, Cassius Khan, Kreuger Singh, Ustad Irshad Khan and the Fusion Ensemble Shiamak's Indo Jazz, Mississauga's Sampradaya Dance and Sri Sanskriti Dance, DK Bollywood, Nachdi Jawani and others. F night opens with a screening of the film Singh Is King at 9 p.m. Things continue with the Rock The Coliseum youth concert, runs from 4-11 p.m. and continues on Saturday and Sunday. Organizer Bushra Mahmood was pleased to announce that the Mare would reunite for the first time in four years to perform at the concert. Other bands scheduled to play include The Mel Band, DD/MM/YYYY, Junius and Burning Brides, among others. There are several elements to the festival, including main-st entertainment, visual arts displays and vendors selling a variety of products and food. Prior to the festival, there will be a S Asian Film Festival running June 17-19 at the Central Library. To help build interest in the festival, the Art Gallery of Mississ has been hosting the Bazgasht: Traditional Methods and Modern Practices exhibit since May.
